Dear Governor Sebelius:

This is the 2004/2005 Annual Report of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission (KRGCC/commission). The report is a narrative and statistical summary of the KRGCC's regulatory responsibilities for calendar and fiscal years 2004/2005.

During 2005, two facilities licensed by the KRGCC continued to offer year-round greyhound racing. The Woodlands, located in Kansas City, offered 237 days of live greyhound racing, with 285 live racing performances. Wichita Greyhound Park (WGP), located in Valley Center, offered 254 days of live greyhound racing, with 305 live racing performances. Together, this accounted for approximately 8,723 live greyhound races. In addition, the Woodlands offered 26 days of live horse racing, with 263 races being run during September and October 2005. Since closing in November 2000, Camptown Greyhound Park, located in Frontenac, has conducted no racing activity.

Eureka Downs, located in Eureka, offered 19 days of live horse racing, with 519 races run during the months of May, June and July 2005. Anthony Downs, located in Anthony, offered 6 days of live horse and greyhound racing, with 45 horse and 41 greyhound races.

In addition to live racing, the Woodlands and WGP offered simulcast greyhound and horse racing in 2005. Eureka Downs offered only simulcast horse racing. The Woodlands also used simulcasting to provide their horse and greyhound races to other locations throughout the country. The amount wagered on races at the Woodlands that are simulcast to other racetracks continues to be a bright spot, with an increase of 5.7 percent over 2004.

For 2006, the KRGCC has approved the Woodlands to offer 264 days of live greyhound racing, with 298 performances, and 30 days of live horse racing; WGP has

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been approved to offer 255 days of live greyhound racing, with 309 performances; Eureka Downs has been approved to offer 18 days of live horse racing; and Anthony Downs has been approved to offer 6 days of live horse and greyhound racing.

The spring of 2005 visited significant change on the commission. Three commissioners – Glenn Braun of Hays, William Falstad of Independence and Kristine McKechnie of Arcadia – were appointed and confirmed. Carol Sader of Prairie Village assumed the chairmanship of the commission. Additionally, Stephen Martino of Topeka was appointed and confirmed to the position of executive director. In an effort to educate the commission and refresh staff, two orientation sessions were conducted in 2005. The first familiarized commissioners with agency operations and staffing assignments. The second provided an opportunity for stakeholders and groups interested in Kansas racing and its parimutuel industry to discuss their operations and activities.

During the past year, the commission amended its policy for conducting background investigations to create uniformity in the application of this process. It adopted an infants-at-work program, which saw some initial use as two fathers brought their infant daughters to the office on a limited basis. Also, the commission adopted a new policy for hearing regulatory violations, requiring three commissioners to serve on a hearing panel. The hearing panels provide commissioners an opportunity to gain greater knowledge of track operations and violations that occur within the Kansas racing and parimutuel industry.


In 2005, the greyhound industry nationwide again encountered a severe strain of the kennel cough virus. This infection prompted the KRGC to quarantine both greyhound racetracks operating in Kansas at various times. The Woodlands stopped racing between April 24 and May 5 because the virus had infected too many dogs to keep an adequate racing schedule. The Woodlands ran a reduced number of races from May 6 to May 14 because of the same reason. By May 15, enough greyhounds had been successfully treated to allow for the running of full race cards. WGP offered a full live racing program throughout this period and did not lose any days of live racing because of kennel cough virus.

The Woodlands experienced a slight increase in attendance of 2.3 percent, or 306,539 visitors. However, all handle categories were down, with live greyhound handle, including the off-track wagering of the Woodlands greyhound outbound signal, down 10.7 percent to \$17,559,317.80. The simulcast handles at the facility were down 7 percent to \$42,296,629.60. In total, all handles were down 8.2 percent to \$59,753,783.40.


WGP, unfortunately, saw a significant decrease in attendance, down by 8.9 percent to 156,490 visitors. This also foretold of decreases in handle, too. Live handle was down 17.88 percent to \$6,654,561.80. (WGP does not send out its races.) Simulcast handle was down 10.4 percent, to \$22,849,201.50. Total handles were down 12.2 percent to \$29,503,763.30.

The KRGC will continue to work diligently to assist the racing community and will continue to ensure the integrity of parimutuel racing in Kansas. The KRGC looks forward to working with you and your staff, the Legislature and other state agencies in carrying out its responsibilities.

In 1995, the Iowa Tribe of Kansas and Nebraska, the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation of Kansas, the Kickapoo Tribe, and the Sac and Fox Nation of Missouri in Kansas each signed a Tribal State Compact with the State of Kansas. By 1998, each had opened its own casino in Kansas. Each of the casinos continues to operate today. Each is regulated by a Tribal Gaming Commission. The gaming activities of each are monitored by the Kansas State Gaming Agency. According to KSA 74-9805, the Agency has jurisdiction over gaming activities conducted pursuant to a Tribal State Compact. The Agency has jurisdiction over no other types of gambling, legal or illegal, or alcoholic beverage dispensing or use.

The Kansas State Gaming Agency is responsible for conducting background investigations on all employees connected with the gaming operations at each casino. The Agency is also responsible for conducting background investigations on all vendors who sell more than \$10,000 per year in gaming equipment to a casino in Kansas. The Agency does original background investigations as well as addenda, upgrades and renewals of investigations which have been done in the past. In FY 2005, the tribes submitted 730 background investigation requests of employees to the Agency. In addition, KSGA performed 25 vendor or manufacturer background investigations in FY 2005. Currently, employee background investigations of all types are being completed in an average time of about 37 days, a decrease from 41 days in FY 2004.

Licensing of gaming employees and vendors is done entirely by the Tribal Gaming Commissions. The Agency can and does occasionally object to particular applicants.

Key employee investigations, vendor, and tribal gaming inspector investigations are completed by enforcement agents. Frequently these investigations involve travel out of state. Vendors typically pay the expenses of the Agency for their background investigations. All other gaming employee (dealers, security, hard and soft count, cage, slot techs) investigations are completed by special investigators who are not sworn law enforcement officers. The four casinos and commissions currently have about 1113 casino gaming employees and 38 tribal gaming inspectors. The Agency contributes varying amounts of background information on each.

Nine enforcement agents, sworn law enforcement officers, conduct inspections and monitor gaming activity at the four casinos. Currently there are 2827 electronic gaming devices (slot machines), up from 2683 in FY 2004. During FY 2005, 469 electronic gaming devices were inspected. Because of an ongoing arbitration, one casino experienced slot machine inspection during only one month of FY 2005. There were approximately 2100 electronic gaming devices in Kansas in FY 1999. There are currently 66 table games (blackjack, poker, craps and roulette) at the four casinos in Kansas. In FY 1999, there were 76 table games.

For the past several years, the Agency shared an executive director with the Kansas Racing Commission. Since April, 2003, the Agency has had a full time executive director.

Enforcement agents of the Agency investigated several criminal cases the past three years. One case involved an employee who allegedly possessed unauthorized computer files from a previous gaming employer. The guilty verdict in that case has been recently upheld in part by the Kansas Supreme Court. One charge was remanded. In one case a patron attempted to use counterfeit bills in a slot machine. He pled guilty after an investigation by KSGA. The final case involved two out of state patrons who are alleged to have attempted to cheat a slot machine. One person has pled guilty in that case. In each of these cases, at least one person was apprehended and charged. KSGA is currently investigating several cases of counterfeit checks which have been passed at Kansas casinos.

An investigation that began in FY 2003 has resulted in a former agent of the Arizona Department of Gaming (ADOG) and the president of a slot machine distributor being indicted in Arizona for bribery in early FY 2005. The information was initially developed by KSGA and relayed to ADOG who requested an investigation by the Arizona Attorney General. A license application for the slot machine distributor in Arizona is still pending and being opposed by ADOG.

Late in FY 2003, the Agency upgraded its computer system to a server based network connected to high speed internet access with backup capabilities. Each employee now has access to the internet as well as access to email. Email is now regularly used to transmit information to and from employees. This purchase has greatly increased the efficiency of the Agency.

In late FY 2004, KSGA purchased a document imaging system from a Topeka based company. The system uses high speed scanners and hard discs on the server to store electronic images of documents. In addition, the software provides statistical data for evaluating agency performance as well as individual employee performance. The system will mean that KSGA will reduce the amount of floor space devoted to storing documents in the future as well as providing quick access to past case files. This system will permit tribes to transmit disclosure forms and attached documents to KSGA electronically if they have compatible systems.

The operating budget for the Agency in FY 1999 was \$1,366,000. Six years later, in FY 2005, the operating budget proposal for the Agency is \$1,701,030, an increase of \$335,030, which is an increase of just over 24% over seven years. Salaries compose about 73% of the Agency's budget. After the FY 2006 assessment letter was sent out, KSGA conducted a detailed examination of the budget and made adjustments to several budget categories to more accurately reflect the actual expense history of the Agency. That examination resulted in a budget proposal for FY 2006 of \$1,718,850, an increase of \$118,471 or 7.4% from FY 2005. That increase can be found in an increase of \$43,302 in rent for new offices, \$72,304 for the 27th check and employee cost of living increases and \$8606 in additional charges from DISC .

In FY 1999, there were 20 employees in the Agency. In FY 2006, there are 21 plus some vacant positions that may be filled sometime in FY 2006. One enforcement agent position has been added in the past five years. The Agency has approval for and may hire a full time lawyer for FY2006. There are an increasing number of issues that will require considerable complex legal work in the future.

The Agency's budget is funded entirely by contributions from the tribes. Under the Tribal State Compacts, the tribes are not required to make any other contributions to the State of Kansas. The only exception to the tribes funding the costs of the Agency occurs if the Agency is ordered to pay any expenses of arbitration. In FY 2003 arbitration expenses amounted to \$2900. There were no arbitration expenses in FY 2004. In FY 2005, an arbitration was settled and the Agency paid \$5355 in agreed arbitration expenses .

On July 1 of each year, KSGA borrows \$450,000 from the State General Fund to cover expenses until tribal contributions are made. Unspent tribal contributions from the previous year are returned to the tribes in the form of a credit against the next fiscal year's assessment. Essentially the Agency has no carryover and starts from zero each year. The entire amount borrowed is repaid during the course of the fiscal year following receipt of tribal assessment payments. To date, \$300,000 has been repaid in FY 2006.

Each year at the end of July, the Agency determines its budget, subtracts any funds unspent from the previous fiscal year, and then sends a letter of assessment to each tribe. Along with the assessment letter, the Agency includes a copy of each tribe's account and a list of each and every voucher used to pay Agency expenses during the past fiscal year. This list includes an explanation of each expense. The tribes have a period to object to their assessments. Assessments are due September 21, January 1, and April 1 of each year. As of this date, each tribe is paid up to date. There was one objection to the FY 2006

assessment. That tribe sent a copy of their letter of objection to the members of the Joint Committee on State Tribal Relations. A letter of explanation was sent to the tribe and copied to members of the committee and to your office. It should be noted each tribe's average assessment actually decreased by \$2446.60 for FY 2006 from FY 2005.


Previously, the tribes were each assessed three equal payments over the year. As a result of an arbitration that was completed during FY 2003, the first assessment due in September is now adjusted. The payment is adjusted to reflect the cost of conducting background investigations for each tribe. The casinos vary widely in size and in numbers of employees. Consequently, the numbers of background investigations also vary widely. This disparity is now accounted for in the first assessment of the fiscal year. The other two assessment amounts are equal among the tribes.

There were two arbitrations active in FY 2005. Both concerned the right of the Agency to inspect electronic gaming machines at one casino. Those arbitrations were settled through negotiation in FY 2005.

In FY 2005, KSGA moved to new office space in the Eisenhower Office Building. This increased KSGA office space from about 4500 square feet to about 6500 square feet. The new office space includes a conference room capable of seating 23 comfortably. With the addition of this new space, KSGA began a new program in which tribal gaming employees are invited to attend agent training that is sponsored by our Agency. During calendar year 2005, the Agency presented 23 training classes on such topics as slot machine technology, fraud, identity theft, interviewing skills and report writing. The classes were attended by KSGA agents and employees from all four tribes. The classes had a total of 498 students.

The increased space also permitted room for KSGA to have gaming equipment for agents to train on.

There is still a proposed compact negotiated between a consortium involving the Kickapoo and Sac and Fox tribes in Kansas and the Governor's Office to build and operate a destination casino in Wyandotte County. It is unknown if this proposed compact will be considered for approval by the 2006 Legislature. If this proposal or any other tribal proposal becomes a reality, the Agency will undergo some dramatic changes and expansion in a short time to fulfill those additional responsibilities.









Racing and Gaming Commission Funds Fiscal Year 2005



State Racing Fund - K.S.A. 74-8826

All taxes on live parimutuel wagering, admissions tax, application fees, license fees, and fines that were collected by the Commission were credited to the State Racing Fund. Two-thirds of the parimutuel taxes on simulcast performances were credited to the State Racing Fund. All operating expenses of the Commission were paid from the State Racing Fund.

Horse Fair Racing Benefit Fund - K.S.A. 74-8838

This fund's revenue is derived from one-third of the parimutuel taxes from simulcast races. The Commission distributes monies from the fund for expenses related to the conduct of race meets conducted by a fair association or horsemen's nonprofit organization.

Horse Breeding Development Fund - K.S.A. 74-8829

This fund's revenue is derived from breakage and unclaimed winning tickets from live and simulcast horse performances. The funds are distributed by the Commission for purse supplements, stakes races, and breed awards to animals registered in the Kansas Bred program. There are also equine research grants awarded by the Commission.

Racing Investigative Expense Fund - K.S.A. 74-8835

All expenses of investigation of an applicant's qualifications for an organization license, facility owner license or facility manager license are paid from this fund. Whenever another state agency assists the Commission in investigations and incurs costs in addition to those attributed to operations of the agency, those costs are paid from this fund. The applicant reimburses the Commission for all costs related to their investigation.

Greyhound Breeding Development Fund - K.S.A. 74-8831

This fund's revenue is derived from unclaimed winning tickets from greyhound races. Fifteen percent of the receipts are transferred to the Greyhound Tourism Fund. Thirty-five percent of the receipts are used to fund research conducted within the State of Kansas relating to the prevention of injury and disease of greyhounds. Fifty percent of the receipts are returned to the track where they were used to supplement stakes races for Kansas-whelped greyhounds.

Racing Reimbursable Expense Fund - K.S.A. 74-8827

All fees for processing fingerprints of licensees are deposited to this fund. The expenses incurred for the processing of fingerprints of licensees are paid from this fund.

Racing Applicant Deposit Fund - K.S.A. 74-8828

An applicant proposing to construct a racetrack facility is required at the time of making application to make a deposit. If the racetrack is constructed in accordance with the terms of the application, the deposit and interest are refunded. If the applicant fails to complete the racetrack facility in accordance with terms, the deposit and interest are forfeited by the applicant.

Tribal Gaming Fund - K.S.A. 74-9808

All amounts collected by the state gaming agency pursuant to tribal-state gaming compacts are deposited to this fund. All operating expenses of the state gaming agency are paid from this fund.



Departments of the Commission



Licensing

The Licensing Division ensures the integrity of racing and wagering in Kansas by identifying, licensing and conducting background checks on individuals who work at the racetrack facility, owners of the racing animals, and industry personnel participating in racing. These individuals are required to obtain an occupation license and undergo a background check before working or racing animals at the facility. In addition, licenses are granted to facility owners, facility managers, non-profit organizations, concessionaires, racing and wagering equipment and services, and simulcasting entities. Officers, directors and owners of these entities are subject to background investigations before a license is granted by the Commission.

Occupation Licenses

In 2004 there were 3,590 occupation licenses issued and in 2005 the commission issued 3,339 licenses to industry personnel and racetrack personnel during the license year. One-year and three-year occupation licenses were issued in different license categories for the race meets at the Woodlands, Wichita Greyhound Park and the county fairs. Over 600 sets of fingerprints in 2004 and over 560 sets of fingerprints in 2005 were submitted to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation for background checks. Licensees were able to participate in the fingerprint reciprocity program in lieu of submitting fingerprint cards. Licensees submitted fingerprint reciprocity forms for 13 different racing jurisdictions in both 2004 and 2005 that were recognized by the commission. These reciprocity records were then verified with the specific jurisdiction in order to complete the background check on the licensee. Facility and organization licensee payrolls were checked monthly to ensure employees were properly licensed and racing proofs were checked to verify owners, trainers, jockeys and entities were properly licensed and registered prior to racing.

Registrations

Stable names, kennel names, corporations, partnerships, syndicates and other entities that own racing animals, which participated in racing in Kansas, were required to register with the commission. Entities filed 422 registrations during the 2004 license year and 368 registrations in 2005. Owners of these entities were required to obtain an occupation license.

Concessionaire and Racing and Wagering Equipment and Services Licenses

Concessionaire licenses are required before any entity may sell goods or services at a racetrack facility. There were 85 concessionaire licenses granted in 2004 to entities providing animal feed, tack and supplies as well as food and beverage concessions and video and photo finish products. Also included in these was 1-3 day Special Class Concessions for special events such as craft shows, train shows, etc. In 2005, 46 concessionaire licenses were granted to businesses selling goods and services at the racetrack facilities. Racing and Wagering Equipment and Services licenses were issued to entities providing equipment and services to facility and organization licensees during 2004 and 2005. These included services such as totalisator, photo finish, video replay and starting gates. There were seven entities in 2004 and ten entities in 2005 that were granted Racing and Wagering Equipment and Services licenses.



Departments of the Commission



Animal Health

The Kansas pari-mutuel racing act provides that the commission appoint an animal health officer and assistants to advise the commission in matters of veterinary medicine. At all times they are to serve and protect the health and well being of the racing animals. The animal health officer serves on the commission staff in Topeka, and two assistants serve at each racetrack.

The animal health officers are responsible for conducting veterinary services for racing animals. This includes physical examinations prior to racing and observation for lameness, illness, or any other condition which would prevent the animal from racing to its potential. They are also responsible for treating emergencies of a veterinary nature encountered during the running of the race. In consultation with the racing judges or stewards, the animal health officers help determine which animals may be scratched from racing due to injury, disease, or disability.

Racing animals are subject to drug testing to deter the use of drugs to influence the outcome of a race. The animal health officer at each track is charged with obtaining blood and/or urine samples to be submitted to the official testing laboratory. A concerted effort is made to obtain the desired specimens from the animals and deliver them to the laboratory under strict chain of custody procedures so that a given specimen is unadulterated and from the identified animal.

During 2004 and through October 2005, the racing chemistry was performed by Truesdail Laboratories in Tustin, California. Testing in November and December 2005 was performed under a new contract by Center for Tox Services in Tempe, Arizona. The results of the testing programs are as follows:

Departments of the Commission



Racing Division

Parimutuel wagering and racing activities at each racetrack is under the general authority and supervision of the Commission's appointed greyhound racing judges and horse racing stewards. The judges/stewards may interpret the regulations and order appropriate action to ensure a fair race and to protect the best interests of racing. The stewards and judges conduct administrative hearings; levy penalties on licensees; observe each race to ensure races are conducted in accordance with the regulations; determine the official winner and respective positions; maintain a detailed written account of each question, dispute, protest, complaint and objection; excuse any racing animal that is unfit or ineligible to run; submit and file for each performance a written judges/stewards report for each performance to the commission office.

Security Division


Security personnel are vested with the power and authority of law enforcement officers in the execution of the duties imposed upon the commission by the provision of the parimutuel racing act. The division's goal is to ensure licensees involved in racing activities are honest, to be proactive and responsive to confidential information concerning potential illegal activities, and to eliminate and/or reduce the potential for accidents. The commission appointees serving as security personnel work towards achieving the goal by investigating violations of the race act, conducting search and seizures, and enforcing all criminal laws of the State. The security personnel also conduct background investigations for various management positions within the racing industry as well as those for all commission employees.




The Wagering Dollar

Simulcast Racing - 2004







